

Crowley Scholar and researched governmental compliance with international human rights standards in Northern Ireland and Kenya. Prior to attending law school, he worked for a European record label on North American artist development.

CK SWFTT

Auctioneer



CK Swett, a California native and Duke University graduate, began his career in the auction world in 2006, and has worked at Christie's, Phillips and Heritage for ten vears. In 2016, he founded Lot 1 with former Christie's colleague, Charles Antin, in order to better address the critical importance of nonprofit fundraising.

CK's charity auctioneering efforts since 2010 have yielded more than \$50 million across nearly 400 events that support everything from school children in Malawi and public schools in Manhattan to veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan and the American Cancer Society. Hailed by The New York Times as having "managed to shake up the staid world of auctioneering," CK set the world auction record for boxing memorabilia in February 2012, selling the gloves Muhammad Ali wore during

his 1965 fight against Floyd Patterson for \$1.1 million on behalf of the Lou Ruvo Center for Brain Health.

When not convincing bidders to raise their paddles one last time, he is often found swimming, playing chess on his phone, or singing enthusiastically off-key.

HFFSUN I FF

Rapper-songwriter



HeeSun Lee isn't vour average Hip Hop emcee. Put up for adoption in her native Korea at the age of four months, she was brought to America and raised by Chinese parents on Staten Island, NY.

"My biggest struggle growing up was with my

identity, dealing with stereotypes, and not knowing where I belonged because I was adopted. I had to constantly remind myself that I am legit. Hip hop saved my life and from a lot of things," she confesses.

All of Lee's diverse experiences fused to create the illuminating backdrop for her sophomore CD, Stereotypes, which was released in 2014 and placed #7 on iTunes' Christian/Gospel charts and #24 on Billboard's Christian Gospel. On her third album, Beauty For Ashes (released in 2016 as an independent artist). HeeSun made her epic comeback to music with a bombastic wall of sound. Her album's progressive energy and hype will change the game of hip-hop for many years to come. Her fourth album, *Flying Cars*, dropped on March 8, 2019 and hit #14 on iTunes' Hip-Hop chart.

Jacquelvn is a Korean-American adoptee based in New York City. She is a singer-songwriter and jewelry designer who works closely with Women Cross DMZ and the New Yorkadopteeorganization, Also-Known-As, Inc.

They have since started to make music together. Jacquelyn is also a registered yoga instructor, and promotes mindfulness and healing within her community. 
SOUTHPOLE FOUNDATION

Philanthropy-in-Action Award

Founded by two brothers, David and Kenny Khym, Wicked Fashions, Inc. began in 1991 when it launched its flagship brand, SOUTHPOLE®, in New York City, the fashion capital of the world. SOUTHPOLE® is a premium urban brand influencing urban fashion in American street culture.

The Southpole Foundation was established in 2004 to support the welfare of the community by providing economic assistance and leadership in socially meaningful ways. The Foundation funds scholarships that benefit students who don't have the financial means to attend colleges; it also awards grants to organizations that provide services to the community and promote community service.

For over 10 years, the Southpole Foundation has supported the Korean American Family Service Center. First, the Foundation helped fund the Rainbow House program that provides emergency shelter to victims of domestic abuse, and then the Foundation underwrote the Hodori After-School Program for elementary and middle school students.



EAST-WEST SCHOOL OF INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

Community Impact Award

Opened in 2006, East-West School of International Studies (EWSIS) is a small, comprehensive public school serving grades 6-12 that inspires its students to explore the world at large. Having a special focus on Asian languages and cultures that can help students develop guiding values such as self-discipline, community, high standards, and perseverance, EWSIS trains students to become experts in Asian cultures and languages while preparing them for careers in an international world.

The Hodori "Little Tiger" After-School Program at EWSIS was funded by the School's Out New York City (SONYC) initiative through the Department of Youth and Community Development (DYCD) in 2014 and is five years strong in its partnership with EWSIS. Aligned with EWSIS' mission, over 200 Hodori

middle school students benefit from free, high-quality after-school programs and summer programs each year.

The "Little Tiger" program at EWSIS serves middle school students ages 11 to 14 from low-income, immigrant, and working-class families. The students build self-esteem, improve their academic achievement, develop leadership, and cultivate social skills by engaging in a mix of educational, creative, and recreational activities that are culturally relevant and developmentally appropriate.

The unwavering support of Principal Anthony Cromer at EWSIS accounts for the success of the Hodori program each year. Under his leadership, EWSIS provides dedicated facilities and educational technology tools such as Chromebooks and smartboards. Principal Cromer often communicates with the Hodori program staff to discuss

student performance and improvements. He also encourages parental involvement through the Hodori program to promote healthy and positive personal and academic growth of the students.

KAFSC is deeply pleased to present EWSIS and Principal Cromer with the Community Impact Award as a vital members of our community and we truly appreciate the support and commitment for providing quality service to the students and their families.

Aivoung is passionate about creating community through friendship, education, and activism. She has dedicated most of her life to ending violence against women and working for a more just and peaceful world.

Born in Korea during World War II and growing up in Shanghai, Taiwan, and Japan, she came to the U.S. for college in Illinois, majored in Art, and subsequently made New York City her home. Originally a painter and sculptor, her interests expanded to other fields that included entrepreneurship, teaching, publishing, human resources, and public relations. With management skills gained from years of experience, she became a consultant to nonprofit organizations after her retirement. Over the years, she has served on a number of boards of directors including the Coalition for Korean American Voters, Korean American Family Service Center, Asian Americans for Equality, New York Women's Foundation, Manhattan Country School, Union Theological Seminary,

In 2015, she traveled across the demilitarized zone from North Korea to South Korea with a group of international women activists calling for the official end to the Korean War, and she currently serves as Chair of Women Cross DMZ, a global movement continuing to work for peace and reconciliation on the Korean Peninsula.

She has received numerous awards for her vision, compassion, and leadership. She is a mentor to many, both young and old, with whom she enjoys sharing her dream of a world that is kinder, more inclusive, and just.

Aiyoung has two sons and six grandchildren, lives with her husband Gene on Manhattan's Upper West Side, and frequently goes around the world to visit friends and extended family. She speaks Spanish, a little Korean and Japanese, and loves to cook, dance, and travel.



VIVIAN LEE

Lifetime Engagement Award

Vivian Lee joined NY1 as an anchor and reporter in 2008, and was nominated for an Emmy for her work hosting and reporting for Spotlight New York in 2019.

She has anchored and reported on stories of vital local and national interest. including anchoring NY1's team coverage of Pope Francis' historic visit to Cuba and the U.S. in September 2015. In March 2013, she reported from Vatican City for several weeks leading up to Francis' election as pope and was the first reporter of the New York City market to break news that a new pope had been elected. Several months before that she had been reporting from the flooded Financial District hours after Hurricane Sandy hit New York City. In 2011, she was the first in the city to report the sale of fake gold bars in the Diamond District of Manhattan. Vivian has also anchored hours of continuous coverage of breaking news, including the assassination of Osama bin Laden in May 2011 and the mid-

air collision of a helicopter and plane over the Hudson River in 2009 that killed nine people.

Vivian's career in New York started at WNBC in 2002, where she was a general assignment reporter for several years. Prior to that, she was the parliamentary correspondent for federal affairs for the CHUM Television Network in Canada. Her seven years reporting and anchoring in various cities across Canada include stints at CJOH in Ottawa, ATV/ASN News in Halifax, A Channel News in Calgary, and CityTV and CP24 Cable News in Toronto.

She graduated with high honors from Carleton University's Journalism program in Ottawa. She has appeared as a guest speaker in high schools and colleges, including Centenary College in New Jersey, Hunter College in Manhattan and Long Island University in Brooklyn, and was awarded Mentor of the Year by The City University of New York's Asian American/Asian Research Institute. She is on the board of KoreanAmericanStory.org, and lives in New York City with her husband and two children.

KOREAN AMERICAN FAMILY SERVICE CENTER



1990

KAFSC holds its first volunteer training workshop series on domestic violence conducted in Korean and English, and publishes its first newsletter in both languages.

At the first New Year's Eve party, KAFSC launches OTTUKI CLUB, a support group for single mothers with children. The "ottuki doll" is a symbol of resilience to single mothers surviving abuse, divorce, or widowhood and raising families.

1992

KAFSC collaborates with VISION 25, a television program on Korean Channel 25, to produce a five-part series on domestic violence in the context of Korean-American life

The office of NYC MAYOR DAVID N. DINKINS recognizes KAFSC with the STOP THE VIOLENCE AWARD for its work in the intervention and prevention of domestic violence and sexual assault.

1995

KAFSC organizes its annual "SILENT MARCH" commemorating Domestic Violence Awareness Month in the Main Street area of Flushing, Queens.





1989

Inspired by Dr. Tai Young Lee, KWANGHEE KIM and fellow community activists take on the challenge of starting a nonprofit organization dedicated to helping Korean victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in New York City in a culturally and linguistically appropriate setting.

KOREAN AMERICAN FAMILY SERVICE CENTER (KAFSC) 뉴욕 가정문제 상담소 is born.

On October 20, 1989, KAFSC opens its doors to the public at the Korean Methodist Church and Institute's chapel on West 115th Street in Manhattan. With 20 volunteers and seven

consultants, including lawyers, clergy, a social worker, and a psychiatrist, KAFSC holds office hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6 pm-9 pm and answers all phone messages within 24 hours.



199

KAFSC receives its first institutional grant from the NEW YORK WOMEN'S FOUNDATION allowing it to hire one full-time and one parttime staff member.

Psychiatrist DR. SEOK CHEOL AHN helps set up protocols and guidelines for counseling and mental health services at KAFSC.



1994

KAFSC's family support services program provides recreation and respite to troubled children ages 9-13 and their families. In collaboration with FLUSHING YMCA, the Center expands its programs by creating the HODORI CLUB, an after-school and summer program for children of domestic violence survivors with a class of 15 students.



1997

MANAGING DIRECTOR BONA LEE increases the Center's visibility in the community by speaking at various seminars and events and on a regular talk show on Radio Korea.

SANCTUARY FOR FAMILIES' CENTER FOR LEGAL SERVICES establishes a resident attorney position at KAFSC, providing pro bono legal services to our clients. We begin a long partnership with DORCHEN LEIDHOLDT, DIRECTOR OF LEGAL SERVICES and attorneys CATHERINE BANSON, JENNIFER LEE, and HILARY SEO.

THE NEW YORK WOMEN'S FOUNDATION honors KAFSC at its annual "Celebrating Women Breakfast."

BOARD CHAIR AIYOUNG CHOI is one of five Asian-American role models profiled on WNBC (Channel 14) in a series of 30-second on-air salutes during Asian American Heritage Month.

Survivors of domestic violence who demonstrated outstanding courage and determination receive the first OTTUKI AWARDS, sponsored by KWANGHEE KIM, at the 8th Anniversary Gala.

1999

HODORI CLUB expands to five days a week. Sexual assault workshops at area high schools and youth groups reach 400 students.

Twenty-nine trained volunteers keep the 24-hour Hotline running during non-office hours (6 pm - 8 pm, weekends, and holidays). During National Crime Victims' Rights Week, KAFSC receives and OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD presented by the U.S. ATTORNEY GENERAL JANET RENO of the Department of Justice (one of eight awardees in the U.S.).

KAFSC changes its Korean name from 뉴욕 가정문제 상담소 to 뉴욕가정상담소 to reflect the expanded mission to provide comprehensive services promoting healthy relationships in families.

KAFSC receives a new grant from the NYS CRIME VICTIMS BOARD, which allows the Center to strengthen its counseling capacity. Over 150 people each month receive assistance.

2000

KAFSC relocates to a new and larger office in Flushing, Queens to provide better access to our targeted clients.

2002

YOUTH COMMUNITY PROJECT TEAM (YCPT) launches a youth-led, leadership building program that gives high school students of Korean heritage opportunities to engage in community service projects and become anti-violence advocates.

The UNNI-HYUNG (Big Sister-Big Brother) MENTORING PROGRAM begins a community-based, one-on-one mentoring program matching high school students with young professionals.



2004

With support from Verizon, the Center launches the TECH TALK PROJECT, a computer-assisted learning program for recently immigrated women and children affected by domestic violence.

2006

KAFSC begins providing counseling and information on the website MIZVILLE.

KAFSC publishes VOICES, a compilation of personal accounts of trauma, suffering and healing, written by domestic violence survivors and witnesses.



2008

JUNGSOOK "GRACE" YOON becomes the new Executive Director, the first ED who is not a social worker. SARAH BJ SUNG is elected as Chair of the Board. Their strong leadership firmly stabilizes the agency, doubling the funding, staffing, programming, community outreach, and inter-agency collaboration.

The KOREAN CENTRAL DAILY awards the Hongik Award to KAFSC in recognition of its service to the Korean-American community.

2003

KAFSC establishes WISH (Women with Independence, Support, and Hope) GROUP to provide a supportive network for domestic violence survivors who are coming out of the crisis stage of domestic violence to the inner-healing process towards self-sufficiency and well-being.

2005

KAFSC's growth over the years allows it to service 974 clients in 2005.

FILIAL THERAPY PROGRAM begins helping parents enhance relationships with their children by shared activities in play therapy.

2007

The annual WOMEN'S HEALTH FAIR brings approximately 150 uninsured and under-insured women to receive preventive health screening services.



2009

KAFSC receives its first federal grant from the U.S. Department of Justice Office of Violence Against Women (OVW)—one of 58 national agencies to receive a quarter-million dollar grant to launch a TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM, the only one of its kind in New York providing long-term housing options for Korean and Asian women.

Celebrating 20 years of services to the community, the BOARD OF DIRECTORS envisions tremendous growth of the organization and adopts a new expanded mission statement and logo.



2012

Due to major funding cuts from New York City, the Hodori program transforms to a sliding scale fee-based program for low-income immigrant students, yet continues to be a strong after-school program in the community. HODORI PROGRAM MANAGER MI JUNG YOU receives the 2012 PASEsetter Award from Partnership for After-School Education in recognition for her eight years of service dedicated to disadvantaged youth.

KAFSC Circle of Friends Co-Founder and BOARD MEMBER MYUNG SHIN LEE receives the Volunteer in Service to Asian American Communities (VISAC) Award from CMP, Inc. and the Ong Family Foundation in recognition for 20 years of service to KAFSC.

KAFSC's second restaurant table-mat campaign to highlight crime victims' rights awareness reaches 100,000 people at 16 restaurants in New York and New Jersey.

KAFSC answers 1,620 hotline calls, provides 1,985 counseling sessions, and houses seven families (seven women, eight children) in the TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM.

2014

KAFSC's first "TRAIN THE TRAINERS" volunteer training begins to prepare volunteers to move beyond traditional volunteerism to become community educators.

KAFSC's first youth-led rally in front of Queens Borough Hall during SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH increases awareness in the community of crimes involving domestic violence and sexual assault.

First "Family in Art" contest spurs the community to re-examine what family means to them through the exposure of the creative visions of young artists and provides scholarship to low-income students.

On January 2, 2014 KAFSC merges with WOMEN IN NEED CENTER (formerly known as Rainbow Center of NY) thereby adding emergency shelter services to its now fully comprehensive range of services for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

On May 16, 2014, KAFSC celebrates its 25TH ANNIVERSARY BENEFIT GALA.



2016

KAFSC launches a new initiative, PROJECT GROW!, a business enterprise that engages and benefits KAFSC clients.

First cohort of KAFSC's Babysitting Training program graduates after receiving the American Heart Association's Family and Friends CPR Certification.

More than 200 people come out for the 19th annual Silent March.

Garden of Hope and Arab-American Family Support Center join KAFSC for the Purple 5K Dash event to raise awareness, friends, and funds to end domestic violence for a #DVFreeQueens.



2018

KAFSC welcomes new Board Chair ESTHER LIMB and new Associate Board Chair WILLIAM KANG.

SAENAM KIM is appointed as Deputy Director, a new position created to provide oversight of programs, data collection and analysis, and reporting.

2010

KAFSC receives another OVW grant to launch PROJECT SAFE (Strengthening Asian Community, Furthering Empowerment), which enables hiring of full-time staff solely dedicated to implementing strategic community outreach and education.

Due to innovative advocacy and outreach efforts, KAFSC receives the COMMUNITY JUSTICE AWARD from the Manhattan Borough President, SCOTT STRINGER'S OFFICE.

THE FRESH AIR FUND recognizes KAFSC as Queens Outreach Partner of the Year for its efforts in serving low-income children in summer camps through partnership.

KAFSC moves its gala venue from QUEENS TO MANHATTAN making a positive impact on fundraising and friend-raising.

2011

Among one of AVON FOUNDATION'S first 32 grant recipients nationwide, KAFSC begins its SELF-SUFFICIENCY PROGRAM to guide and assist victims and survivors towards economic stability through free legal clinics, ESL, QuickBooks, and computer classes, as well as intensive case management.

The first step our clients take is to tell their story. This is an important step that helps their healing process and helps us to determine the services they need. Here are just a few of those stories. For the safety of our clients, their names have been changed.

yung Hee lived in Connecticut with her daughter and her abusive husband. She was isolated and did not have much of a support system. Her situation was compounded by her limited proficiency in English and lack of knowledge about U.S social services systems. She did not know where to begin to get the help she desperately needed. One day, she saw an article in *Mom and I* magazine and found the Korean American Family Service Center's 24-hour hotline. Calling that number turned out to be the first of many steps she took toward a violence-free life for herself and her then one-year-old daughter.

After speaking with a social worker at KAFSC, she decided to leave Connecticut and come to New York. She was immediately placed in KAFSC's Transitional Housing program where she found a safe home for herself and her daughter.

At KAFSC, Kyung Hee received counseling and participated in a peer support group for 18 months.

Thanks to KAFSC's Self-Sufficiency program she enrolled in, Kyung Hee was able to take English classes, receive job training, and learn computer skills to prepare herself for a self-sufficient life. She also received individual job consultation for resume development and received scholarship assistance. Through the legal clinics, Kyung Hee was able to obtain legal residency in the U.S. through a Violence Against Women Act petition.

In February 2011, Kyung Hee became certified as a home health aide which enabled her to obtain part-time jobs. She then received a scholarship through KAFSC and became a Certified Nursing Aide in September 2012, placing her one step closer to her goal of becoming a Registered Nurse. In April of 2013, two years after finding that hotline number, Kyung Hee successfully completed and graduated from the Transitional Housing program. Eventually, Kyung Hee obtained a full-time job at a local hospital. With a stable income, she was able to get her own apartment and fully support herself and her now threeyear-old daughter.

un Jung was emotionally, verbally, and financially abused by her husband **√**who then abandoned her and her two sons. She was completely alone to raise small children, a one-year-old and a three-vear-old. She had no relatives or close friends in the U.S. to turn to. In a desperate state, Eun Jung sold whatever she had just to buy food. Soon she had nothing left to sell and was on the verge of being evicted from her home. By the time she reached out to KAFSC, she had only sixty-one dollars left in her bank account.

Eun Jung had called KAFSC's 24-hour hotline several times but hung up each time because she was crying so hard she couldn't speak. Finally, she was able to hold it together long enough explain her situation and make an appointment. She spent what little money she had on bus fare for herself and her children and headed to KAFSC to meet with a KAFSC counselor.

Eun Jung and her chldren were immediately placed in Rainbow House, a short-term residency at the Korean American Family Service Center. The moment they arrived, Eun Jung and her sons were welcomed by staff and volunteers. She recalled that day as feeling like she was coming home to chinjung, her mother's house.

During her stay at Rainbow House, Eun Jung made a plan with KAFSC counselors and met with a selfsufficiency coordinator. With help from the shelter's director and board members she got a full-time job—her first since she came to the United States 10 years ago.

After three months, Eun Jung signed up for the Transitional Housing program and moved with her sons into a safe apartment in a decent neighborhood, with rent assistance.

"I'm so happy these days, although others might disagree when they see my situation. I know I have further to go compared to others, but I am not worried because I

have my counselors at KAFSC and staff who will help me to become self-sufficient."

un-ah is a 35-year-old mother of a six-month old baby when she first came to KAFSC seeking help with a court summons regarding the custody of her child.

Sun-ah had recently fled her fiancé's home after his abuse had become violent and she feared for her baby's safety and for her own. She could not go to the police out of fear that her fiance would retaliate and report her to the immigration authorities about her expired visa status. She had been hiding out at her aunt's and friend's but he tracked her down and demanded to see the child to whom he was previously abusive.

She recalled, "I was shocked and I feared losing my baby. I looked all over but could not find anyone to help me with this. I even consulted with lawyers in the area. However, no one would do anything without a police report."

But Sun-ah kept looking and found the Korean American Family Service Center. There she met with a social worker who gave her information on how to submit a police report. But when she went to the police station the sergeant refused to file her case. The following week, Sun-ah went back, this time with the KAFSC social worker who understood the process and was able to get Sunah's case filed and received her police report.

On her first day in court, Sunah was granted a full order of protection and her fiancé was arrested. Back at KAFSC, she was provided with housing through the Transitional Housing program and permitted to stay in the U.S. to fight for the custody of her child. While in the housing program, a case worker from the New York City Administration of Children's Services (ACS) investigated Sunah's case, brought a safe bed for

the baby, and assured Sun-ah that her baby would not be taken away. Sun-ah is still battling for full custody and continues to receive support from KAFSC. With the help of KAFSC's counseling and victim advocacy services, she hopes to gain full custody and make a life and a home in the U.S. for herself and her child.

aesoo experienced physical and verbal abuse while she was still dating her eventual husband.

After finding out she was pregnant, she hoped the relationship would improve and that they would raise their child together. Instead, his behavior grew worse. Despite the abuse, she married him and they had two more children. One day, after being severely strangled by her husband, Haesoo ended up in the emergency room. There she gathered the courage to call the police.

When she was discharged from the hospital, she was immediately placed at a local shelter. She had three months (customary limit for shelter residency) to figure out where she would go next. But the severity of the physical, emotional, and psychological abuse she suffered, the daunting responsibility of caring for three small children, and her limited income made it impossible for her be on her own in just three months' time.

To allow her more time, the shelter referred Haesoo to KAFSC's Rainbow House, giving her an additional three months plus the variety of holistic services KAFSC offered, such as a path to permanent housing, job-seeking support, and child care to help her become self-sufficient. Afterwards. Haesoo was accepted into KAFSC's Transitional Housing program. This meant Haesoo could provide her children a safe home of their own in a familiar neighborhood, KAFSC's Transitional Housing program also helped Haesoo build credit and provided a rent subsidy which gradually decreased over time.

Haesoo has obtained a parttime job as a parent advocate and enrolled in a Certified Nurse Assistant program with financial support from KAFSC. As she headed toward graduation from KAFSC's Transitional Housing program, Haesoo's goal to build a financially independent life for herself and her children became a certain reality.

Building a new life was not easy for Haesoo. Yet, she was resolute and worked hard, and never wavered in her determination to create a better future for her family.




TYPES OF CASES

In 2018, the Korean American Family Service Center served 676 clients and provided over 19,000 units of service through our counseling, support, advocacy, and housing programs for the intervention and prevention of domestic violence (DV) and sexual assault (SA).

Our 24-hour Hotline

KAFSC'S 24-hour Hotline is the first point of contact for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault who seek our help. The callers, who may be the victims or calling on behalf of one, are referred to a KAFSC counselor. The counselors work with each client to determine the services and programs needed to help them create a safer, healthier, and happier lives. Needs that cannot be addressed through KAFSC services are referred to partner agencies or other service providers.





Special Circumstances in DV/SA Cases



TYPES OF VICTIMIZATION

Domestic violence and sexual assault survivors experience multiple and diverse forms of victimization. We hope the below illustration, albeit simplified, helps to shed slight on the complex, and often messy, issues of domestic violence and sexual assault, the victims, and their struggles—none of which fall into neat categories. The numbers shown are based on the clients we served in 2018.



OUR PROGRAMS

24-HOUR CRISIS HOTLINE

Operating around the clock, seven days a week, our bilingual hotline provides crisis intervention, safety planning, and emergency shelter placement to victims of domestic violence (DV), sexual assault (SA), and other personal crises.

In 2018, we responded to 1,640 hotline calls. 1,520 victims of DV, sexual assault, child abuse, and human trafficking were served. Among them, 1,254 (83%) were immigrants and 1,040 (68%) had limited English proficiency.

RAINBOW HOUSE EMERGENCY SHELTER

Following an unprecedented merger with Rainbow Center of New York (formerly Women In Need Center) in January 2014, KAFSC now offers Rainbow House, the only emergency shelter of its kind in the Korean-American community, providing access to temporary safe housing, familiar ethnic meals, transportation, therapy and other public benefits, with assistance from a dedicated social worker. It also connects clients with pro bono professionals offering legal assistance, acupuncture/medical services, and even free haircuts. The shelter is an important, healing bridge between immediate crisis and long-term safety and selfsufficiency, connecting individuals with important services.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM

In 2009, KAFSC became one of 58 agencies nationwide to receive \$250,000 from the U.S. Department of Justice. We used this funding to launch the Queens Immigrant Transitional Housing Program, the first and only program of its kind in New York City for women in the Korean-American community. The program offers warm homes, rental assistance, and child care subsidies for up to 24 months, in



addition to culturally sensitive, holistic support services for victims and their children fleeing violence. It gives clients the necessary time and means to realize a stable family structure, putting them back on the path to physical, emotional, and financial independence

There is a high demand for this program, with an active waiting list at all times with 13-18 families on the list on average. During fiscal year 2018, we successfully served seven women with 12 children. This year, 15 eligible families who went through the admission process for the program could not be admitted in the end due to limited capacity.

INDIVIDUAL & FAMILY COUNSELING

KAFSC's core program is crisis intervention and counseling on a short- or long-term basis, available to all clients regardless of their backgrounds. We offer one-on-one sessions or integrated sessions that include other family members. Counselors help address emotional distress, depression, isolation, conflict, fear, and anger. These emotions are often triggered by DV, SA, child abuse, human trafficking, or other personal or family turmoil. Additionally, counselors

frequently provide support on issues such as divorce, parenting, intergenerational conflict, poverty, crime, addiction, and bereavement.

Legal & Social Services Advocacy

Domestic violence and sexual abuse survivors learn about their legal rights and options through KAFSC's free Monthly Legal Clinics and one-on-one consultations with attornevs from partner agencies such as Sanctuary for Families, Her Justice, Queens Legal Services, and the Korean American Lawyers Association of Greater New York (KALAGNY). We provide other support, including assistance with accessing health care and other public benefits, as well as court advocacy and interpretation for orders of protection, child custody, and other legal rights.

Parenting Counseling & Education

Our one-on-one Parenting Education Program is designed to provide culturally-sensitive education to parents in the Korean-American community that will prevent child abuse and neglect, as well as help parents build healthy communication and relationships with their children.

OUR PROGRAMS

The curriculum fulfills mandatory or recommended parenting education requirements of the Administration for Children's Services (ACS), and comprises eight weekly private sessions. In 2018, 21 parents benefited from our 1:1 Parenting Education program with a 71.4% graduation rate.

Sexual Assault Intervention & Counseling

KAFSC is the only organization in the tri-state Korean-American community to offer assistance specifically to SA and rape survivors. We provide crisis intervention, counseling, court advocacy, and support services to women and girls who have been victimized. Like DV, these crimes impact women of all ages and socioeconomic statuses. Thus, KAFSC continues its extensive education and outreach via public service announcements, youth mobilization, and other programs that inform and empower. KAFSC held its first youth-led Sexual Assault Awareness and Victim's Rights Rally in front of Queens Borough Hall in 2014. Each year, there has been increased participation and outreach in awareness-raising campaigns.

Women's Support Group (WISH) & Children's Support Group

Women with Independence, Support, and Hope (WISH), formerly called Ottuki Club, was launched in 2003 for DV survivors and/or single mothers, to help them gain self-awareness, confidence, and self-reliance. Through a variety of art therapies and culturally appropriate group activities, members learn selfexpression, communication skills, parenting, stress release, conflict resolution, and self-care. They initially meet weekly for eight weeks to share experiences in a creative, safe, nonjudgmental environment, then once a month for continued peer support.

Our staff provides guidance, encouragement, and resources. Concurrently, our social workers facilitate age-appropriate Children's Support Group activities for WISH participants' children who have been affected by domestic violence.

Anti-Human Trafficking Program— Project HOPE

Flushing is a hub of human/sex trafficking in this country. KAFSC works with Judge Toko Serita and the Human Trafficking Intervention Court (HTIC) in Queens and helps Korean defendants who are highly likely to have been trafficked get assistance and connect with resources. KAFSC creates a safe, culturally comfortable space where participants receive therapeutic counseling, financial education and job training/ referrals. Participants also gain access to useful information on women's health and immigration rights and remedies. KAFSC also participates in coalition-building around trafficking issues in New York

SELF-SUFFICIENCY PROGRAM

Job readiness skills are provided to clients so they can gain self-confidence, basic competencies, and economic self-sufficiency. We provide basic to advanced ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) and computer classes taught by teachers funded through grants. We offer handson job skills trainings such as Sewing Class and Babysitter/CPR training.

Our Self-Sufficiency Counselor works with each client individually and offers 1:1 job consultation, assisting clients with resumes, job interview skills, job applications, and scholarship opportunities. Furthermore, we conduct Financial Literacy workshops covering banking, credit, debt, taxes, saving and

financial planning as well as financial abuse education and Job Seminars which provide accurate information about employment opportunities and which expand clients' horizons. In 2018, the program served 171 clients.

HODORI AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

Elementary and Middle School Students

Based on New York City's development framework, the year-round Hodori "Little Tigers" Program helps students ages 6 to 14, all from low-income, immigrant, working families. The students build self-esteem and improve their communication and social skills by engaging in a mix of therapeutic, creative, and academic activities that are culturally relevant and developmentally appropriate.

Students meet three hours after school every day school is in session, and come for full days during the summer. Where applicable, students receive individual or group counseling on a short- or long-term basis, and we encourage Hodori parents to interact with our staff regularly.

In mid-2012, after government funding cuts, Hodori adopted sliding-scale fees in order to meet demand. In September 2014, through DYCD (Department of Youth and Children Development) funding, we were able to add a second site that serves middle school students in one of the most impoverished areas of Queens. Our Hodori programs are currently offered at East-West School of International Studies (EWSIS) and JHS 189 Daniel Carter Beard School.

Enrollment priority is given to children of our DV clients. Over 95% of students are from immigrant families. 37.5% of students are recent immigrants with limited English proficiency and minimal support networks.

KAFSC PROGRAMS

YOUTH COMMUNITY PROJECT TEAM (YCPT)

YCPT is a youth led group of high school students dedicated to raising awareness about relationship abuse and sexual assault in their local communities. Through weekly discussions, these young volunteers learn about social justice advocacy and hone leadership skills while forming their identities as individual agents of change.

In 2018, YCPT helped organize our third annual youth conference, the Queens Youth Collaborative (QYC), with community partners (Minkwon Center for Community Action, KCS, Asian Americans for Equality). The QYC 2018 theme was "Build a Skill, Gain Awareness, Level Up." Our goal was to allow attendees to gain awareness of critical issues present in their community, develop skills needed to become better leaders, and level up. The event provided youth with various workshops such as "Healthy Relationships" and "Mental Healthy" led by young professionals. There were a total of 50 attendees.

Unni-Hyung Mentoring Program (UHMP)

KAFSC's "Big Sister-Big Brother" program matches clients ages 10 to 18 with an adult, typically a young professional or an older college student, who provides friendship and guidance. After our careful recruitment and screening of potential mentors, we introduce youngsters to caring individuals who serve as both friend and role model. These positive relationships enable mentors to help little brothers and sisters broaden their interests, cope with identity issues, improve their selfesteem, and develop school and career goals.

Project Girls Own Artistic Leadership (GOAL)

The Project GOAL (Girls Own

Artistic Leadership) program runs once a week as one of the after-school club activities at the Young Women's Leadership School of Queens from 2:30-5 pm on Wednesdays. Thus, there are 2.5 contact hours per week over each eight-week cycle. The project is uniquely designed to provide a group of adolescent girls (ages 14-18) an active leadership role and governing voice through the planning and implementation of media art projects. Utilizing media arts and technology, Project GOAL offers an artistic and innovative approach that empowers young women of color to reframe their sense of value and worth and engage them in ways that help develop healthy selfidentity, enhance their leadership and advocacy skills, and achieve their personal potential. Project GOAL's recent achievements

COMMUNITY OUTREACH & EDUCATION

24-Hour Hotline Volunteer Training

A semiannual five-week, oncea-week intensive training course prepares bilingual volunteers to work the 24-hour hotline.

Harmony Volunteers

Harmony is a group of trained hotline volunteers and advocates who help recruit and coordinate volunteers.

Faith Leader Engagement

KAFSC recently launched a multi-pronged effort to engage Korean American clergy in DV prevention and recovery. Since churches are often the only institutions with which many Korean-American immigrants maintain regular contact, KAFSC convenes bilingual trainings for clergy members and help them respond appropriately to instances of domestic violence

brought to their attention. We also deliver presentations on domestic violence to congregations.

Silent March Against Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault

Every year during Domestic Violence Awareness Month (October), KAFSC organizes a silent march in partnership with local police, churches, various sister agencies, and other community-based organizations, to raise awareness about DV and SA and promote social justice. This march is a culmination of community events and activities held throughout the year. Participants march in silence through the streets of Flushing protected by police escorts, honoring the many lives lost to DV and reaffirming our commitment to its eradication.

Training, Education, & Outreach

We offer ongoing community workshops throughout the tristate area that cover a broad range of subjects. We also speak at local events, appear on radio and TV, write regular editorial columns in the Korean-American press, visit schools, churches, hospitals, police stations, and other nonprofit and civic organizations to reach out to the community. All our workshops are free and open to the public.

KAFSC NJ OFFICE OPENS MARCH 8, 2019



n March 8, 2019, the Korean American Family Service Center, a New York Citybased organization, held a press conference and reception in Fort Lee, New Jersey. The reason: to announce the opening of their office in Bergen County, which has the highest concentration of Korean-American residents in the United States. The event was well attended by stakeholders from the local community, KAFSC leadership, members of the press, and even two officers from the local police precinct. Speakers included Choon Kim from Family in Touch, a New Jersey-based organization that provides family counseling and other services, Kyung Hee Choi from Holy Name Medical Center, a comprehensive healthcare facility located in Bergen County, Councilman Peter Suh of Fort Lee, and Jhanice Domingo, a family attorney from Einhorn Harris, a wellestablished, full-service legal firm in New Jersey.

The journey began long before. For years, KAFSC knew that their work would not stop at the city borders. While the organization is based in New York City, the 24-hour hotline, staffed by trained volunteers, serves as a virtual door to everyone seeking help, regardless of their location. Over the years, the hotline has received an increasing number

of calls from residents in the tri-state area, and beyond, It was inevitable that KAFSC would open its physical doors in New Jersey where many of the out-oftown calls originated. In the early 2010s, when Grace Yoon, then-Executive Director of KAFSC, and Board Chair, Sarah BJ Sung, had a vision to give access to services to Korean-American communities beyond New York City. Six years later, KAFSC received a grant from the US Department of Justice -Office of Violence Against Women (OVW) earmarked for opening an office in New Jersey.

Despite its high concentration of Korean-Americans, Bergen County does not have an organization dedicated to serving victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in the Korean-American community. But KAFSC was not coming to duplicate services already being provided by the existing organization but

only to provide services for needs not currently being met. With this message in hand, Sarah BJ Sung, former Board Chair and Chair Emerita, and founder and principal of Pinnacle Social Impact Consultancy, organized a listening tour. For a month prior to the opening, BJ, along with Saenam Kim, KAFSC Deputy Director, and two KAFSC counselors met with local elected officials, hospitals, police departments, potential partner organizations, and community leaders to learn about their work and discussed opportunities for collaboration in order to serve the needs of the community better.

One vision, many years, countless doorknocking, and hundreds of hotline calls later, KAFSC did not just open an office in Bergen County, it became a part of the community.

KAFSC opened an office in New Jersey to provide direct services to the community in Bergen County and throughout the state.

- Educational Workshops on Domestic Violence for Community Groups and Organizations




